- In the past I have personally supported HIV/AIDS charities. I have an LGBT staffer with whom I review the city budget and analyze funding for HIV/AIDS treatment and education programs.

- 5) What is your position regarding funding for HIV/AIDS treatment and education? We should provide a level of funding that helps protect against the transmission of HIV/AIDS and supports HIV/AIDS patients. Public resources are limited, and we should therefore focus on the programs that provide the widest and most effective range of services for HIV/AIDS treatment and education.
